

HONOLULU ORCHID SOCIETY JUDGING

The **Honolulu Orchid Society** conducted orchid judging on Saturday, October 16, 2021 at the Lanakila Senior Center. Fourteen plants were brought in and registered for judging. All the plants were screened and five were judged and received awards by the Judging Panel. The awarded plants are shown below and continues on the next page.

The final two **HOS Judging Session**s of the year will be held on **Saturday, November 20, 2021** and **Saturday, December, December 18, 2021** at the Lanakila Senior Center. Members and guests are encouraged to bring their orchid plants for judging. You do not need to be a member of HOS to have your plants judged.

Everyone entering the Lanakila Senior Center **must wear a mask and keep social distance.** A maximum of 10 people can be in the room at one time. 

ORCHID TIP OF THE MONTH BY SCOT MITAMURA

I am currently training new personnel at work, and I am finding it difficult for staff to take me seriously. We recently cut a dying leaf of our largest Corpse Plant or Amorphophallus titanum. The saw used was not sterilized, and the 100-pound corm quickly melted into a mushy, stinky, bacterial infection.

This reminded me to stress the importance of sanitation and the sterilization of all our orchid tools and supplies. Not only for viruses, but for bacteria and fungal infections too. The best way to sterilize is heat. I use a Bernzomatic self-igniting propane torch. There are other methods, but heat is your best bet.

Pruners should be sterilized for around 3-4 seconds, making sure that all moisture is dissipated from the pruner blade. This goes for pruners, saws, potting sticks, plant/flower stakes and any other utensil that is used on the orchid. Also, don't forget a clean tabletop. I work on a pile of old newspapers changing sheets after each plant.

How about those dirty hands? Yes, they need to be washed with soap and water after every plant! If you are reusing pots, please sterilize them in a ten percent household bleach solution and soapy water for at least fifteen minutes (I do it overnight so the roots get softer) and remove all roots with a green scouring pad. After scrubbing, dip them in fresh water and let them air dry. Do not leave any old roots as they can possibly infect a new orchid.

Whenever we groom, or re-pot an orchid, we are like a doctor doing surgery. He would never consider re-using a dirty scalpel! Viruses are really tricky, and because of Covid 19, we are now familiar with the term asymptomatic (meaning without symptoms). Viruses are often asymptomatic but can still cause irreversible damage to the plant by causing a lack of vigor, poor growth, and poor flowering. The same virus that may be asymptomatic on one orchid could be devastating on another, causing crippled growth, color breaks on the flowers, and eventual death of the plant.

There are two main viruses that affect orchids, Cymbidium Mosaic (CMV) or Odontoglossum Ringspot (ORSV). You can test your orchids by taking a leaf sample to the University of Hawaii or purchase home test kits from Agdia. I don't do much testing other than when I am working with the virologists at UH. I know folks that test every orchid coming into their collection, making sure that none of them are virused, but this gives them a false sense of security as one can only test for two viruses.

There are many more lurking out there, and viruses have the ability to go from one species of plant to another. We have discovered that Watermelon Mosaic (WMV) is responsible for Vanilla Necrosis (VNV) in Tahiti and Samoa, and yet we found it here in Hawaii, on Den. anosmum (honohono).

We must assume that every orchid could possibly have a virus or some other pathogen and always practice good sterilization. I am now aware about sterilizing before working on all of my plants. It is a good habit to get into. Unfortunately, we do not have a vaccine available to prevent the spread of these viruses. I wonder it a mask could help?

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Best Pumpkin Cream Cheese Bars

(The Pioneer Woman.com by Erica Kastner Aug 4, 2021)

For the Crust

1 % cups Graham Cracker Crumbs (about 10-12 whole crackers)

½ cup salted butter, melted

2 tbsp powdered sugar

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

2. Place graham cracker crumbs, melted butter, and powdered sugar in a mixing bowl and mix until well combined. Press firmly into the bottom and partway up the sides of the prepared baking dish. (Place in a parchment-lined 8" x 8" square baking pan and press the crust firmly into the bottom of the pan and partway up the sides.)

3. Bake in preheated oven for 10-12 minutes, or until crust is just starting to change color. Set aside

to cool completely.

For the Pumpkin Filling:

4 tsp cold water

1 tsp plain gelatin

4 oz weight cream cheese

½ cup powdered sugar

¾ cup pumpkin puree

½ tsp cinnamon

¼ tsp nutmeg

¼ tsp ginger

1/8 tsp cloves

1 pinch salt

1 tsp Pure Vanilla extract

34 cup heavy whipping cream

1. Place the water in a small saucepan. Sprinkle the gelatin on top. Set aside for 10 minutes.

- 2. Meanwhile, in a large mixing bowl beat the cream cheese and powdered sugar until smooth. Add pumpkin, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, cloves, salt, and vanilla and beat again until smooth.
- 3. Heat the gelatin mixture over the stove, whisking often, until gelatin completely dissolves. Pour into the pumpkin mixture and beat well.
- 4. In a separate mixing bowl, beat whipping cream until stiff peaks form. Gently fold into the pumpkin mixture in 3 even additions. Be careful not to deflate the whipped cream too much.
- 5. Cover with plastic wrap and place in the fridge while you make the topping.

For the Topping

4 oz weight cream cheese

3 tbsp powdered sugar

2/3 cup heavy whipping cream

¼ cup chopped toasted pecans

1. In a mixing bowl, beat cream cheese and powdered sugar together until smooth. Gradually add whipping cream. Beat until stiff peaks form.

2. Spread over the pumpkin filling with an offset spatula. Cover with plastic wrap and chill the bars in the refrigerator until they are set, about 4-6 hours. Just before serving, sprinkle with the toasted pecans. Serve chilled.

Notes: You could add a bit a cinnamon to the crust or use cinnamon graham crackers if you like loads of cinnamon flavor. Feel free to substitute walnuts, almonds, or your favorite toasted nuts for the pecans. **Yields 16 servings.**
