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
HONOLULU ORCHID SOCIETY (HOS) FEBRUARY 2024 GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

Date: Wednesday, February 14, 2024 <u>Time/Place</u>: 7:00 to 9:00 PM, Lanakila Elementary School Cafeteria (Doors open at 6:30 PM) <u>Program</u>: "Orchid Fleck Virus" <u>Speaker</u>: Dr. Michael Melzer

Orchid fleck virus (OFV) causing yellow lesions on leaves and stems was found infecting rough lemon and mandarin orange trees in February 2020 on Hawai'i Island. The virus causes yellow or black leaf lesions on a wide variety of hosts.

Dr. Michael Melzer from the University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) will give an update on OFV and its impact to various agricultural products in Hawaii including orchids.

At the meeting the Society will continue its popular **Plant Culture Table** competition with two categories of growers: **Novice Category** (up to 4 years of growing orchids) and **Masters Category** (more than 4 years of



growing orchids). Members are encourage to bring their plants to the Culture Table 10 to 15 minutes before the meeting starts. Prior to the Refreshment break, attendees will be given the opportunity to view the plants and vote on the plant in each category they liked the best based on the flower appearance, fragrance, uniqueness or overall plant growth.

Great Silent Auction Will Be Back

The Honolulu Orchid Society's **Great Silent Auction** will be held on March 13, 2024, at the Lanakila Elementary School Cafeteria. Members are encouraged to start grooming their plants and consider donating a few for the auction. Last year we enjoyed excellent plants donated by members. Orchid Tip of the Month by Scot Mitamura

Did you know our official winter just started, in fact December 21, was the start of our winter. It is the shortest day of the year and each day from then on will get longer, yay!!!. I hope you have all been adjusting your watering schedule and are not getting any Phytopthera or Black Rot. My areas that are on irrigation have been turned off after the first week of November and I have only been hand watering the dry areas as needed. At Foster Gardens we have been getting nightly showers keeping the orchids way too wet. Fortunately, my media is holding up and still draining well with all the Styrofoam I have been using on the bottom and sides of the pot. So far so good, no Black Rot. I have also been mixing in fungicide with my insecticide to prevent the fungal outbreak. Fungicides work their best when used preventively and not as well curatively. So, I made it a point to start adding it early before the rains started.

This year, I had really bad experiences with the flower orders from the Big Island. FedEx missed a couple of overnight deliveries and some boxes were left unopened for an extra day. Normally, I always open the boxes ASAP, for several reasons. The orchids need lots of air, and the longer they are not opened the chances for damage becomes greater. Ethylene gas can buildup in the boxes causing the flower buds to abort and the leaves to vellow. Fungal spots can appear on the buds, and especially bad in the winter months when the plants are shipped out too wet. This is what happened and even though I opened the box when I received it, it was already too late. The leaves were all yellowing and the flower buds started to get black spots on them. Soon these spots grew into each other and the flowers began to rot away. Total disaster!!! Even though I kept the flowers in a covered area through the rains, the humidity was so high, the fungus spread to the other plants, and now has set into my flowering greenhouse. In hindsight, I should have separated the orders to avoid any cross contamination. A note for anyone ordering plants, make sure you have an adequate area set up with good sunlight, air movement, and rain protection. Have enough trays to separate the plants, placing them in every other hole in the trays. This will allow for sunlight and air circulation so the orchids can bloom well. It is also a good idea to stake up the spikes, so that the flowers will arrange well. And then adjust the stakes as the flowers begin to open. Ordering orchids is fun and exciting when things go right, but when things go wrong, it can be a costly disaster. So always be prepared for the worst and sometimes you need to make the best of it.

<u>Recipe of the Month</u> Tapioca Dessert with Fruits

This is the dessert that was brought to the Installation Banquet at the Natsunoya Tea House. If you like Tapioca, you will like this. It is very refreshing and delicious.

Ingredients

- 1 cup small tapioca pearls
- 7 cups water
- 1 ½ cup sugar
- 1 can (13.5 oz) coconut milk
- 3 cans Shirakiku mixed fruit with natadecoco, drained
- 1 can lychee fruit, drained, cut in fourth
- 1 bottle sweet coconut gel, drained

Directions

In a large 8-quart pot, boil water. Gently stir tapioca pearls into boiling water. Stir occasionally to keep pearls from sticking. Boil for 20 minutes



until pearls are translucent. Turn heat off. Cover pot, remove from heat and let it sit for 30 minutes. Add sugar and stir into tapioca until dissolved. Set aside and let cool. (Cooling off will take 1-2 hours) When cool, add the coconut milk and mix well. Add drained fruit and coconut gel to tapioca and mix gently to combine. Refrigerate before serving.

Carol De Witt. suggestion – save the juice liquid from one can of the mixed fruit with natadecoco. Add the liquid as needed if you feel it's a little "dry" when you add the drained fruit and coconut gel to the tapioca mixture and combining it.
