
**Program:** Water: The most

Roy Tokunaga will be explaining in detail why water is the most important nutrient to successfully grow and bloom orchids. His goal is to spread the word so everyone can benefit.

As in the past, plants on the Culture Table will be divided into the **Novice Category** (up to 4 years of growing orchids) and the **Master's** 



**Category** (more than 4 years of growing orchids). The audience will be given the opportunity to view the plants and vote on the plant in each category they liked best based on flower appearance, fragrance, overall plant growth or uniqueness.


#### **Welcome New Member**

More information about the Show will be in next month's newsletter.




#### **Condolences**

# Recipe of the Month My Mom's Korean Egg Salad

"My mom makes the best..." is common thing food writers say. I reserve the right to make this claim just once: I'm not exaggerating when I say that my mom makes the best egg salad.

Oftentimes when I went to a friend's house for a playdate when I was younger, I was served an egg salad sandwich—it's easy to make and a winner for adults and



kids alike. I accepted and ate the sandwich with gratitude, but I still have a vivid memory of them always lacking something compared to the ones my mom fed us at home.

After I moved away and started cooking for myself, the egg salads that I made were good but never amazing. I prodded my mom for her recipe and was surprised when she revealed her secret: **My mom adds diced apples to her egg salad**. This simple upgrade makes her egg salads a tiny bit sweeter, more balanced, and gives them some needed texture.

#### How to add apples to your egg salad:

My mom's upgrade can improve any egg salad recipe. All you need to do is incorporate the apples into your egg salad, just like you would add other ingredients like diced celery, chopped red bell pepper, or bacon.

How many apples you add is a matter of taste. For a big batch of egg salad, say eight eggs, my mom uses one big apple. Simply add enough to achieve the sweetness and texture you like.

My mom typically uses a sweeter variety of apples, such as Gala or Fuji. You could go for Honeycrisp, Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, or Pink Lady apples. If you want to use up the fruit you already have on hand, that works too! This isn't rocket science.

**Here's my mom's tip for preparing the apples**: You're going to make a saltwater bath using a ratio of one teaspoon of kosher salt for every cup of water. For a large apple, you'll need one cup of salt water.

Then, peel the apple and cut it into 1/4-inch cubes. Add the diced apples to the salt water to soak for about 10 minutes, drain well, and mix into your favorite egg salad recipe.

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My mom told me to tell you to resist the temptation to rinse the apples after you soak them in the salt water. The mild salt flavor that lingers on each piece will help season the egg salad even more in the best way possible. The salt brine also prevents the apples from browning too quickly.

Though I suspect you'll eat all of your egg salad with apples right away because it'll be delicious, if you have leftovers, store it tightly covered and refrigerated for up to five days.

### Orchid Tip of the Month by Scot Mitamura

As we come into the month of May, we welcome a change in our weather. I think we have seen the last of our winter style 'Kona' storms and are now transitioning into our warm summer months. This means we should expect to increase our watering and fertilizing. Many orchids are sending out new growths and roots, and the plants are hungry! It is during this time that the plants use the long days to grow and store energy for flowering later in the year. This is also a good time to repot many of your orchids. Anything that has not been repotted for two years or more should be considered. In time the media becomes "toxic" to the plants. Organics in the media are broken down and mushy, holding excessive water. Humic acid is formed during decomposition, so your media becomes lower in pH or more acid. Soluble salts begin to build up from fertilizing and our municipal water. It is the white crusty stuff you see on the rim and drainage holes of the pot. There is also very little air space in your media, because as your plant sends out new growths, each growth has its own set of roots, so it becomes root bound. Now your old roots start to die, then it sets off a chain reaction, and soon your beautiful specimen plant has rotted and died. It sounds like I'm talking from many years of experience. I have killed more plants than I would like to admit to (don't tell Karen). If we had a dead plant label contest, I think I would be a hard guy to beat. So please don't be me!

So lets start to notice plants with active new roots and start repotting them during this growing season. In fact, many of your Hono Hono, Den. anosmum, and their hybrids should be finished blooming, so now is the time to repot them and plant to out the one year old keikis. This will give you a long growing season to get your stems long for next year. Yes, its a busy time, but extremely rewarding, with the pay-off being an abundance of beautiful flowers!
